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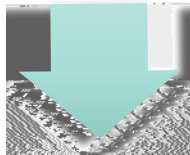
PROJECT OUTLINE

Key research question:
How can legal and policy frameworks governing access to urban growing spaces contribute to community resilience capacities?

- Socio-legal research.
- Holistic approach to political/social/ecological challenges (Brexit, COVID, climate/biodiversity crises).
- Local Partners: BHFP, BHCC.

Research progress so far...

Phase 1(Sussex HEIF COVID Response Fund): Mapping legal/governance models and key sites in Brighton. Construction of database.



Phase 2 (Sussex SPF Evidence-based policy fund): Pilot interviews. Focus groups. Development work on database/public website.



Security of tenure.

Formal structures for management/maintenance.

Organisational structure: formal platform for connection between growers.

Initial findings and next steps

- Diversity of ownership and management arrangements important in meeting community needs.
- Informal/ extra -legal arrangements and relationships crucial, but could also lead to precarity and insecurity .
- Inequality of access limited the resilience benefits accessible to the most vulnerable communities.
