









"An Age When All Are Accepted to College"

- Enrollment problems (low domestic enrollment)
 - Private: Undergraduate, esp. singlepartment colleges in the provinces
 - National: Postgraduate, esp. humanities and social sciences due to the expansion of graduate schools' capac 90,000 in 1991M 260,000 in 2009
- Becoming difficult to recruit enough qualified students into STEM field programs
- Prevailing'skilled migration approach







Employment of International Students Upon Graduation in Japan




- Increasing the need for albally minded workforce îInternational students studying in Japan
